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#### **Secretariat News**

#### Hello 4th Day Community,

During the September Secretariat meeting concerns were raised in regard to the difficulty of building teams for the last few weekends. As this situation was discussed the Secretariat felt that there were a few challenges that needed to be addressed. The community has fallen into an interesting pattern of response and sometimes even behavior. We are challenged with <u>loving each other</u> through our weak, sinful moments. We are challenged with <u>the exercise of forgiveness</u>. We are challenged with making <u>time for service</u> in our busy schedules. We are challenged with <u>loving those around us enough to serve them</u>. We are challenged to <u>keep our Via de Cristo community active and alive in Christ</u>.

#### A few points to consider:

- When receiving a call to work please respond in an appropriate amount of time, no matter what your answer is. Remember it is a conversation not a confrontation.
- New leadership is needed and encouraged, but the seasoned 4<sup>th</sup> dayers need to assist in the raising up of new leaders.
- An invitation to attend a weekend is not the responsibility of the clergy. It is the responsibility of 4<sup>th</sup> day members to invite others to attend a weekend.
- Not all will get called to work a weekend but if you or someone you know is available to work please contact someone on the Secretariat and give them your information. They will relay it to the correct people.
- Communication is one of the key components for the weekends to be successful. Yet, it is one of the biggest challenges we have. One way that we communicate is through the Prayer and Praise email that John Bradford sends out. John has approximately 450 of the Utah VDC email addresses, of those 25%-33% open and read their emails. When compared to the 1,250 4th day members in Utah only 12%-16% actually receive communication. We cannot be dependant on email, facebook or our website to communicate to everyone.
- Updating everyone's information is an enormous task. Please consider being proactive in updating your information. Give your information to a member of the Secretariat and they will forward on to the directory team. Also if you would like to be involved in updating the directory let a Secretariat member know.
- Working a weekend is not for everyone, not all 4<sup>th</sup> Day members return to work a Via de Cristo weekend. That does not mean that they don't support Via de Cristo, it simply means that God has directed them to serve and lead in other ministries.
- Another challenge the secretariat wishes to address is the division of churches and the
  effect it has had on the 4<sup>th</sup> day community. This topic is sensitive but does need to be
  discussed. Via de Cristo is a Lutheran movement but autonomous from any church
  body. The priorities are teaching the gospel of grace, assisting weekenders to influence
  their environments with the gospel, and encouraging a renewed personal relationship
  with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

• Via de Cristo can be a place of healing. A Via de Cristo weekend is a place where we walk in as believers in Christ. It is a place where we can seek refuge in the arms of Jesus with the loving support of our brothers and sisters. All baptized believers are welcome. This is a place where segregation and cliques should not exist and where we serve each other as well as serving the weekenders. Working a weekend should be a snapshot of heaven. A place where God is glorified and we serve each other in a Christ like manner, a place where God would want to dwell and be pleased with His children's love for each other.

This letter has been written so that we may all pause and consider this ministry's goodness and our earthly responsibility towards it. The secretariat wishes for this ministry's continued growth. Via de Cristo is living Gods word through our actions in serving.

St. Francis of Assisi said, "Preach the Gospel at all times and when necessary use words."

Pastor's Corner

**Growing in Christ**:

A Brief Mediation on 1 Corinthians 3

Those of you who have been at team training for the upcoming Via de Cristo weekends, already know that I have been doing a lot of thinking (and talking) about Christian maturity. God willing, my talking is not in that condescending, "grow up" way that immaturity is often belittled by those who "think themselves mature." Rather I pray that I speak as one longing for the fullness of Christ and as one who is praying to eat that same solid food which our Father longs to feed us all.

There is a deeper reason for this focus. It is because Christian maturity is the aim of the *cursillo* movement, and indeed of the Christian life. We are a movement for bringing Christians, like ourselves, to a deeper, more focused faith in Christ via piety, study and action. Our movement is a modern answer to the longing articulated by St Paul in 1 Corinthians 3: "And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh." We *cursillistas* are another tool that God would use to bring his Word to bear on the lives of people in need of new life!

Indeed this is what it means for us to be Christian leaders, for such leaders are simply growing and maturing Christians. The writer to the Hebrews makes this connection explicit when he writes: "For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic elements of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food . . . But solid food is for the mature, for those whose faculties have been trained by practice to distinguish good from evil." (Hebrews 5:12 & 14.) For teachers are, by definition, leaders.

Yet it is a funny thing about maturity. It isn't something that we can create in and of ourselves - or as parents, in our children. The best we can do is provide "nutrients" to support the necessary development. Or to return to St Paul (1 Cor 3:6-7), "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth." (Italics are mine.) Maturity, the growth, is given by God and all that Paul, or Apollos, or anyone else on earth, can do is plant, feed and water. Paul reinforces this point in verses 10 to 15 via a second analogy of the builder who builds on a foundation of Jesus Christ. There is no usable building without a foundation, just as there is no new life without Christ.

However, we can - and do - stunt that desired growth, in ourselves and in others, by indulging our human frailties. Indeed it is such growth-stunting indulgence that Paul is lamenting and confronting in this text! Yet the surest way to avoid that indulgence is to return our focus to Christ. Indeed this is precisely the point of Paul's observation at verse 16: "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" You are God's home and indeed are under God's protection (vs 17). If we live with our focus there, we will see ourselves in God's presence (as we always are) and we will see the growth taking place in our lives.

To bring the point home, Paul reminds us that we have no wisdom without God. He does this by mocking our human wisdom and the collective wisdom of human leaders in verses 18 to 21. At wisdom that is not only ineffective, but unnecessary because in Christ all things belong to us (vs 21). This is true what ever the threat or opportunity, in this life and the next! Why? Because we belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God (vs 23). What better security is there? And that is where our focus belongs, where our life is hid with Christ in God (Col 3:3).
